Baptism is an often forgotten sacrament. Many people think of baptism more as a cultural necessity (who will be the parrain) than a sacrament fundamentally changes us. As a result the sacrament is not fruitful in our lives. We wither on the vine rather than come alive.

Baptism, like all sacraments, is an act of God that we participate in. God is the chief mover in our baptism. Through baptism God acts along with our cooperation. Our sins are washed away. We are configured to Christ. For the sacrament to produce good fruit we must cooperate. "For the grace of Baptism to unfold, the parents; help is important. So too is the role of the *godfather* and the *godmother*, who must be firm believers, able and ready to help the newly baptized—child or adult—on the road of Christian life" (CCC1255). Baptism without cooperation is like planting a seed without tending it.

In the gospel this Sunday Jesus says, "I am the vine and you are the branches." We need to be connected to Christ and his church. If we separate ourselves we "Cannot bear fruit." A vine is a living thing it requires nourishment. God chooses to act always through his church. Even when God seems to act independently of his church He still acts. For example, when in the time of St. Therese a notorious criminal went to the gallows unrepentant. St. Therese prayed for him. Suddenly at the gallows had a change of heart grabbing a crucifix without prompting. Doubtless God acted in his soul. However, God was also acting in the church namely through the prayer of the church. Jesus forms the prayer of the church into an indispensable part of his saving sacrifice to God the Father. In this example we can also see how a soul in prayer is living their configuration to Christ, and how Christ incorporates this act into himself. Christ, his church and the sacraments are inseparable.

Without Jesus it is not that we can do few things. We can do nothing. We depend upon him for our very existence. God in His mercy does not wipe us out because we sin. He allows us to go astray like the prodigal son. All the while, God continues to labor for our salvation. However, even when we live a good life we require God's help. Baptism makes the way for our relationship, but it doesn't foster itself. There is no sanctification without God's help.

In the gospel Jesus says that he prunes the vine. This also means that he purifies us. He uses all of us, our circumstances and foibles. What we see as an obstacle is not an obstacle if we are willing to receive the help that God offers. The difference between St. Peter and Judas was that Peter was willing to humble himself, admit his sin and receive the forgiveness that Jesus offered. Each had the same opportunity for grace. Judas, in his pride took matters into his own hands. It cost him everything he had left. Peter, on the other hand surrendered what he had left totally to Jesus and this made all the difference.

What this world lacks today is not more teachers. There are even atheists who study the writings of St. Thomas Aquinas. What we lack are witnesses of the resurrection like the apostles. What they had was what they received. They allowed their humanity to be filled with the Holy Spirit and this made all the difference. We are almost to the end of the 40 days of the Easter which ends on the Ascension (Thursday May 9th, transferred to Sunday in our Diocese). What will you do with the remaining time with Jesus before he Ascension?
