Monday: Closed Tues-Thurs 8am-3pm Friday-8 am-Noon Lunch: Noon–1pm



What is Ordinary Anyway

We are returning to 'ordinary' time. Perhaps you have wondered what makes this time 'ordinary.' Is it because priests are tired after weeks of liturgical celebrations? Perhaps, but that is not why it is called ordinary. The term ordinary time comes from a usage of ordinary that we don't often use. Personally, I find it helpful to remember how Sundays used to be counted as a help to understanding liturgical time.

The Sundays in ordinary time are called so, not because they are 'ordinary' as in commonplace. They are called ordinary as in ordinal counting. When we count, we often count cardinally, i.e.. One, two, three... However, you can also count ordinally, 1^{st} , 2^{nd} , 3^{rd} ... We have all counted this way without knowing the name. Thus, the Sundays of ordinary time are called 'ordinary' because of the way they are counted. Personally, I find this unhelpful in reference to a liturgical season. I find the old way of numbering Sundays between the major liturgical seasons helpful.

Before the reform of the liturgy under Paul VI there was no 'Ordinary Time.' The season we are in would be titled "Sundays after Pentecost." Personally, I find this helpful because it indicates motion. We are going forward in light of Pentecost towards Advent. This is not an earth-shattering revelation, but it helps me escape from years of wondering why ordinary time. It also helps avoid treating the Sundays of ordinary time as disposable. Every Sunday, even those in ordinary time, are solemnities like Easter is. They are each one of them priceless. That is why I remember them in my head as Sundays after Pentecost, or Sundays after Christmas where the other Sundays of Ordinary time reside.

With God all things are extraordinary. He is always seeking to lift us higher, though we often fight against him or distrust his motives. God says in the first reading that he wants to make us more noble than we are. He lifts our dignity so that we may be an example to the nations. This is God's plan, that we reflect the gospel to those who have not yet come to know Christ.

In the time that Jesus came, the kingship had been co-opted. King Herod is an illegitimate king. The priesthood in Israel had also been corrupted. No longer were the Levitical priests serving, but political appointees who even purchased their office from the Romans. The people are like "sheep without a shepherd." Jesus provides them new shepherds after his own heart, the apostles. What does Jesus do for us today?

Many today feel like they are without shepherds. Even priests can feel lost. I remember the lament of the prophet Jeremiah, "even the prophet and the priest forage in the land they know not" (Jerimiah 14:18 translation from the Liturgy of the Hours). God declares to Jeremiah that the days of great distress will not relent until the days that are coming when God himself will restore what is lost. God still desires us to be a 'priestly people' who sanctify the world. There is nothing the devil can do, or we through our sin can do, to destroy that. Although we can bring great distress upon ourselves. God uses that distress in his great plan to make something beautiful. Jerimiah, for example, is a prophet of great distress who suffers much, but is a prefigurement of Jesus. Jerimiah's hope comes to its perfect fulfillment in Jesus.

How do we endure such days when the people of God seem far from 'priestly.' We repent. We acknowledge our sin and the people's sin like Jeremiah. We allow God to purify our hearts that they may become like fire-tried gold, precious. In this time after Pentecost, let us implore the Lord to send the Holy Spirit to convict us of our sin, and to purify and heal our hearts of all our brokenness that we may embrace our vocation to be a priestly people.
