CCC 336. From its beginning until death, human life is surrounded by [the angels'] watchful care and intercession. Beside each believer stands an angel as protector and shepherd leading him to life. Already here on earth the Christian life shares by faith in the blessed company of angels and men united in God.

This Sunday begins ordinary time. It is not ordinary time as in plain or commonplace. It is called ordinary time because the Sundays are counted ordinally (first, second, third et. al). There is nothing ordinary about the liturgical seasons of the church. All are a mystery. All make use of all the events our lives and invite us to experience them with God. It is when we choose to experience things with God that they take on a new life, the life we seek for in so many places, but which only God can provide.

Before the calendar was changed, there was no 'ordinary time.' For example, this week would be called the second week after Epiphany. After Pentecost, there were weeks after Pentecost. To me, this numbering helps realize the movement between liturgical seasons. One benefit of changing the numbering of the Sundays between Christmas and Lent, as well as Pentecost and Advent are calling attention to the readings at mass in this time apart from the other liturgical seasons. Regardless of what you think of 'ordinary time' the liturgy is always an invitation to the divine. God takes us into his own mystery, and we are invited to participate.

The single biggest reason we don't participate in the divine mysteries is because we refuse. What I mean is that we cannot impose reality on God. We cannot choose for ourselves what is true, and what is false. That is the original sin. Even though we took from the tree of knowledge of good and evil, our ruminations don't make what we think true. Participating fully with God means that we receive from him what is true. We remain free to learn it from the school of hard knocks, but that is not God's will for us. In the liturgy we are taken into God's mystery. We are taught by his word, and nourished with his body and blood.

The liturgical season offer us the opportunity to witness and participate in the divine life of Jesus. The time in between which we now call 'ordinary time' invites us to reflect more on the teachings of Jesus on their own terms instead of focusing on them in terms of Christmas or Easter.

This week President Trump will be sworn in as the 47th president of the United States. Just as we are called to participate in mysteries of God, so we are called to witness these in the world. We care called to intercede for our nation (cf. Jerimiah 29:7). People think that it is politicians who hold back our nation. That is true in part, but it is much more our sin and self-reliance. If we want our nation to flourish, we need to truly be one nation under God.

The way we intercede for our nation is to first seek God's help to repent personally. We need to ask God how we individually need to be more converted to him. If we do this then he will help us do so. We then will receive from God the vision we need to intervene for the sake of our nation. So much of our problem is thinking we know better. God is truly the one who knows better. God truly is the one who knows what our nation needs and how to get there.
