Emergency calls are answered immediately; call office for Holy Communion or Anointing of the Sick.





Saint of the Month

St. Philip Neri (Feast day, May 26) – St. Philip Neri (1515-1595) is one of the Church's most joyful saints. He was born in Florence but was called the Apostle of Rome because his entire priesthood was spent in Rome during a time of crisis where he led many reforms of clergy and laity alike.

His motto was "A joyful heart is more easily made perfect than a downcast one." He lived that way with a playful sense of humor and wit. His famous pilgrimages throughout Rome included music and family picnicking to evangelize souls.

He often went into ecstasies during his celebration of Mass, and sometimes his Masses lasted over two hours. St. Phillip founded the Congregation of the Oratory and died on the Feast of the Sacred Heart in 1595.

"Peter do you love me more than these?"

In today's gospel, it seems Peter is going back to being a fisherman instead of a fisher of men. He seems to be giving up in light of his sin. He is unable to receive God's love. I think Peter believes God does not want him anymore to be among the apostles because of his denial of Jesus. Regardless of Peter's reason for fishing, without Jesus they catch nothing, mind you, Peter is a good fisherman, but without God he has nothing. Jesus seeks to remedy/aid Peter in his fishing so that he may also be restored in himself and fulfilling his vocation.

Sin has a way of overcoming our lives. It affects us in ways that we realize and other ways that we do not. Peter recognizes the weight of his sin, but he does not realize that God can still make use of him. Jesus confronts Peter three times. He already prayed for Peter and forgave him his sins. Why then does Jesus question Peter? Jesus does this for Peter's sake so that he would not be ruled by the memory of his sin.

Modern man is confused about sin. Many people believe there is no sin. Other people believe sin is no big deal. Still others find their sin insurmountable. However, Jesus has already forgiven Peter. In this encounter we witness the healing of memories & the wounds of sin. This is what was still holding Peter back and what only Jesus can offer. Not only the forgiveness of sins, but our interior healing as well.

There is a difference between the wounds and/or consequences of sin versus the guilt incurred by sin. When we commit a mortal sin, we merit spiritual death. When we commit a venial sin, we merit a decay of our spiritual life. Through the sacrament of confession, Jesus removes the guilt of our sin so that we may have life. However, there are often residual effects of sin which remain. These effects may cause us pain, but they are not the guilt of sin. They are the leftover effects of sin. Similarly, after surgery there are effects that require additional treatment or even further surgery. This is one of the reasons we may still feel bad after confession. It is not that we haven't been forgiven, but we, like Peter, have not yet experienced what that means. Peter thought that forgiveness merely meant that Jesus tolerates the fact that we sin, rather than redeeming us. We forget or never knew what Jesus' love really means. As I heard one priest put it, Jesus not only loves us he even likes us. Jesus desired Peter to experience this and understand this.

When Jesus wants to lead us, he often does so by catching us by surprise. This is for our benefit. It is like when we surprise children, so they don't notice as much the pain of a shot or a doctor's exam. Jesus surprises Peter in such a way that he jumps overboard and wades out to meet him. The surprise encounter prepares Peter's heart. Jesus visits the issue of Peter's fears "Do you love me more than these?" Jesus' words touch Peter's wound. He does not want to fulfill his role as leader of the apostles. Jesus points to this reality in Peter's heart. "Do you love me more than these?" Jesus touches the wound directly, but he draws out Peter's love in doing so. The experience is truly humbling for Peter. He has to admit he is not the man he thought he was. However, it is also touching how Jesus deals with Peter. The Greek behind our translation shows Jesus lowering himself to the love Peter is capable of giving. Peter offers to God everything he is able to offer and God accepts this with love. In this way, Jesus demonstrates the nature of his love. It is mercy. Peter is healed by this mercy and goes forth to fulfill his role leading the apostles and sharing what he has received from God.

We, all of us through our lives have experiences which hamper our ability to live in peace. The question is not will it happen. The question is how quickly will we recover. The reading is that whatever our speed Jesus is with us. Let us ask Peter to help us with our own experience. -Fr. Campeaux
