

Laud, O Zion, your salvation,
Laud with hymns of exultation,
Christ, your king and shepherd true

This Sunday we praise the God who loves us so much that he became man, suffered and died in our place. He left us His very self in the Eucharist. Who of us can bear to wait for an appointment that is even 30 minutes late? Jesus waits for us 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year. How often do we appreciate this love of Jesus? We all have family, jobs, and busy lives to live, but do we ever acknowledge the love Jesus bears us to wait for us daily in the Eucharist? Even if we have not always acknowledged Jesus' presence in the Eucharist, the feast of the Body and Blood of Jesus gives us an opportunity to remember, acknowledge, and celebrate Jesus' gift of Himself in the Eucharist.

The love and intimacy of God in the Eucharist is greater than any other love or intimacy. Jesus literally completes us. He gives us His whole self, and through this gift, we receive more than human nature could ever fulfill. Typically when you consume food, it is transformed into us. When we consume the Eucharist, we are transformed by grace to become like Christ.

Something to ponder about the Eucharist. God remains who He is despite what we do or don't do. When we come to mass, we encounter the living God. If we make a Holy Communion, (receiving the Eucharist without any conscious mortal sins) we are enlivened. Jesus lives in us and gives us his own life. I have heard it described this way. We need a heart transplant, our heart is completely wasted. Jesus remedies this by removing our diseased heart and daily, giving us His own heart in the Eucharist. On the other hand, if we make an unholy or sacrilegious communion, Jesus is still very much present, but instead of blessing we eat and drink condemnation upon ourselves (1 Corinthians 11:29).

When we receive the Eucharist sacrilegiously, Jesus is present, but there is no place for him to dwell. It is as if we give Him to the enemy of God to be abused in us. These sacrilegious communions are part of the agonies Jesus experienced in the Passion. He suffered all the sacrilegious commons that ever would be committed in his Passion. This is a painful realization that we torture Jesus in receiving the Eucharist with mortal sin on our soul. Consider also that when we receive Jesus thoughtlessly, that is, when we receive Jesus without any preparation, taking him from the priest as if he were a dead thing. That is less offensive than a sacrilegious communion, but it is still an offense to His love poured out for us. For his part, Jesus still loves those who torture Him or leave Him abandoned like the Apostles. Should we not desire to receive Him worthily and repay His love?

How can we repay Jesus' love? How can we repair the many wounds his heart receives? Before Mary appeared to the three children of Fatima, the angel of Portugal came. He taught them to make reparation for the offenses against Jesus in the Eucharist. To make reparation is to repair the damage that is done. This is precisely what we do when we see someone we love in pain. We stand in the gap and try to alleviate the pain. If the pain is caused by another, we console our loved one. If we caused the pain, we repent and ask forgiveness. The angel of Fatima taught the child to pray the following prayer.

Most Holy Trinity, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, I adore you profoundly, and I offer you the most precious Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus Christ, present in all the tabernacles of the world, in reparation for the outrages, sacrileges and indifference with which He Himself is offended. And through the infinite merits of His most Sacred Heart and the Immaculate Heart of Mary, I beg of you the conversion of poor sinners. Amen

The angel taught the children to pray this prayer prostrate on the ground, making reparation even in their posture for the sins of humanity. After teaching the children this prayer, the angel gave them communion and taught them to receive "the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ, horribly outraged by ungrateful men. Repair their crimes and console your God." Following this, the angel prostrated himself before the Eucharist with the children repeating the prayer again. The message is this. God is a person, and he chooses to suffer our indifference for love of us. He is horribly offended in our day, even by priests. We can console Jesus. Let us do so.

In the name of our Lord who loves us so much and yet is horribly offended I implore you, make reparation. Examine your conscience before receiving the Eucharist. Confess in the Sacrament of Confession any mortal sins, and repeat the prayer of the Angel of Portugal every day and especially when you are in church before the Eucharist. Jesus wants our love. He has already poured himself out completely. Will you not take pity our God who is already so much offended? Let us acknowledge our God, who suffers so many wounds to be available to us in the Eucharist.
